## **Last Sunday Charitable Giving**

The first quarter giving was for Direct Link which helps needy children in Kenya to attend school.

Our second quarter charity is the Bishop's Lent Appeal. This time it is supporting the **Scottish Refugee Council**. As an independent charity, they provide essential information and advice to people seeking asylum and refugees in Scotland. They are passionate campaigners for refugees – providing vital advice and advocacy since 1985 Their vision is for a Scotland in which all people seeking refugee protection are welcome.

## **LENT STUDY 2017**

This year's Lent Study is being held in the Side Chapel of the Church at 7 pm on Wednesday evenings. The course we are following poses the question: "Is another world possible? A world where strangers are welcomed, creation is valued, stuff is just stuff and justice is the norm?" It then goes on to say a resounding "yes" to that question, arguing that, like the Old Testament prophets before him, Jesus gives his followers a radical challenge about how to live in the present and offer a transforming hope for the future. In seven sessions (we will only complete 5!) it focuses on practical issues like hospitality, injustice, the environment and consumer culture. It helps us to discover meaningful ways to respond to these issues with help from carefully selected Bible readings, thought provoking discussion questions, suggestions for practical action, a DVD film for each session, featuring candid interviews with other Christians who are trying their best to embody Jesus' mission in their lives.

Another world is possible! And we can be part of it! Come along and join the revolution!!



## DID YOU KNOW.....?


- The name Easter comes from Eostre, an ancient Anglo-Saxon goddess, originally of the dawn. In pagan times an annual spring festival was held in her honour.
- Easter is now celebrated (in the words of the Book of Common Prayer) on the first Sunday after the full moon which happens on or after March 21, the Spring Equinox. Therefore it can occur on any Sunday from March 22nd through to April 25th.
- In medieval times a festival of egg throwing was held in church, during which the priest would throw a hard boiled egg to one of the choirboys. It was then tossed from one choirboy to the next and, whoever held the egg when the clock struck 12, was the winner and retained the egg!
- The traditional act of painting eggs is called Pysanka.
- The custom of giving eggs at Easter time has been traced back to Egyptians, Persians, Gauls, Greeks and Romans, to whom the egg was a symbol of new life.
- In 1878 President Hayes and his wife officially opened the White House grounds to the children of the area for egg rolling on Easter Monday. The event has been held on the South Lawn ever since, except during World Wars 1 & 2. During the war years the Easter Egg Roll was held at The National Zoo and other Washington locations!



## Drew's Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends

Easter! What an exciting time of year! I well remember the first time I went to all the services over the Easter period. I was young. I was working. But, for the first time in my life I made it a priority to go to everything that was on. Yes, it required a bit of effort to reorganise my usual daily routine, but oh, what a memorable experience! A true roller coaster of emotion!



As I joined the worship in the services it was as if I was living the story. I was right there with Jesus. Starting from the quiet of my Lenten reflections I got caught up in the wild exuberance of Palm Sunday, waving palms and singing loud hosannas. Within a few days I was sitting at table with the disciples, sharing an intimate meal in Jesus presence, aware of the tension mounting all around. I was led to the dark of the Garden of Gethsemane, sleepy and uncomfortable, watching and waiting as Thursday turned into Friday. The horror and suffering of Good Friday reached depths that were unwelcome and left scars that were deep. And then there came the emptiness of Holy Saturday, the gaping chasm of nothingness as Jesus lay in the tomb. What a journey, what a week.

Of course it didn't finish there. It never does. After all the emotion, the tears, the prayer, the emptiness, Easter dawns. If you have experienced the agony, the joy is intense. If you have travelled into the depths, you reach new heights. If you have witnessed the crucifixion, you see the unbelievable of the empty tomb.

We are Easter people. We live daily in the light of the transforming reality that death is not the end, evil can never triumph, nothing and no-one is outside God's unconditional love. We live each and every day in the light of the empty tomb and of the risen Christ. It is a reason to rejoice. It is a reason to laugh and smile. It is a reason to give thanks.

Christ is risen! He is risen indeed! Alleluia!

At Easter it is all bunnies, eggs and lambs in the shops. Why are they symbols of Easter?

One of the oldest Spring symbols in the world is the egg - it promises new life as in Spring, fluffy yellow chicks are hatched from eggs.


