# Rector's Letter

Dear Friends

August in Scotland and September in England have always been months of new beginnings. The children go back to school after the holidays, clubs and societies resume their activities and people, feeling refreshed from their summer break, go back to "normal" with new vigour and vision.



To a certain extent this year is no different to any other. The children are now back at school, some groups and clubs are preparing to open up again and, even if it was just a staycation that we had, a few of us have enjoyed that all important summer rest to recharge the batteries in readiness for the onslaught ahead!

However, in some significant other ways nothing is the same this year. Everything has changed. We are returning to a life that looks and feels very different. Face masks have become the norm. Refraining from hugging or shaking hands is now de rigueur. We are much more aware of our personal space and very wary of touching surfaces in a way that would have been unthinkable 6 months ago. Some of us even think twice about going out of the door onto the street. Having said that, we are also looking out for our neighbours more now and contacting the people we haven't seen in ages. We hope we are working our way through a global event that has left thousands dead, economies stretched and many of us traumatised.

The church is included in this mix. It has not been left unaffected. Many of you will not have received the sacrament for 6 months. Corporate worship has been reduced to an online experience. Friends in congregations haven't laid eyes on each other in a long time. But that is all about to change. A new beginning looms.

At Christ Church we will be opening our doors for public worship again on Sunday 6th September at 11 am and on Wednesday 9th September at 11 am with a said service of Holy Communion repeated on both days. This will be our pattern for the foreseeable future. We will also continue our online provision. Numbers in the building will be restricted to 20 "at a sitting". A booking system has been put in place (either online or via the phone) to facilitate this. Although we will be providing gels and face coverings, please bring your own with you, if you can. While I am very much looking forward to seeing as many of you as possible again in church and to presiding at the Eucharist on your behalf I am very conscious of those of you who, very understandably, feel unable to join us at this juncture. My heart goes out to you. Please know that you are not forgotten. If you have any pastoral needs at all, do not hesitate to telephone me on 01555 663065. I hope and pray that your confidence will return and that, one day soon, I shall see you sitting in a pew in our beautiful little sanctuary on Hope Street.

I would like at this point to express my heartfelt thanks to the many people who have kept Christ Church ticking along under lockdown and to the Vestry who have worked tirelessly throughout this time supporting the clergy and meeting on Zoom to make decisions often at very short notice. They have done a sterling job.

We find ourselves at a new crossroads looking towards a new future. At times like this I always find it comforting to know that God journeys before us. Wherever we go and whatever happens God is there with us, transforming, if we let him, our challenging times into ones of hope and promise. A few lines from Isaiah 43 come to mind: "See, I am doing a new thing! Do you not perceive it? I am making a way in the wilderness and streams in the wasteland." Be heartened by that message.

# The Curate writes ......

# CHURCH IS A REMINDER THAT GOD IS EVERYWHERE

Countless poets and authors have pointed to the reality that God can be found anywhere – at home, in your interactions with people, or in nature. One such poet was Gerard Manley Hopkins who said:



"The world is charged with the grandeur of God...nature is never spent; There lives the dearest freshness deep down things; And though the last lights off the black West went Oh, morning, at the brown brink eastward, springs — Because the Holy Ghost over the bent World broods with warm breast and with ah! bright wings.".

Hopkins, himself a Jesuit Priest, imagined that God's Spirit not only hovered over the creation of the world, but continues to fly over it, infusing it with God's very being. Far from being pie-in-the-sky, this belief that God can meet us anywhere has brought great comfort to Christians the world over during various worldwide lockdowns, which even disrupted Easter itself. We have quickly adapted to finding God at home in front of our computer screens, in a moment of quiet contemplation or in our daily walks for health and mental wellbeing. Thank God that he is everywhere.

But how did Hopkins square his belief in God being in all places with his Sunday duties as a Priest, serving in one of England's ornate chapels – a place custom built for worship. And, having coped with life and worship in Lockdown, how are we thinking about returning to Christ Church. Is there any advantage in doing so or are we best staying put?

Although the Church is the people – as we have been shown afresh by the Coronavirus – the church building remains important because it is a permanent reminder – a sign pointing upwards – towards the reality of God that is all around us. Moses, after he had set the people of Israel free was told to set up a designated place on a mountain for worship, not because God was limited to space and time, but because the people were soon forgetful. Forgetful that God had delivered them from the Egyptians, led them in the desert and brought them into the promised land. Forgetful that the God who saved them remained with them on the journey.

Our wonderful church building is that permanent sign and reminder of what God has done for us in Jesus Christ and what God continues to do. It's shape and movement call us to direct our hearts upwards in the Eucharist, in the Word – and hopefully once again in song (as permitted). The font reminds us to live out our baptism and the altar tells us to celebrate the abundant gifts God gives us – the most precious gift being himself, in the person of his Son Jesus Christ. In an age when we are tempted to forget who we are and who God is particularly when things are tough as they are now, we need all the help we can get to live the life of worship and joy we are called to. So, if you can, gather again in our sacred space, be reminded of who God is and direct your heart upwards in prayer with thanksgiving to the God who is everywhere: to guide, to save and to love us.

### **RETURNING TO CHURCH DURING PHASE 3**

#### **Booking System**

We have been granted permission by the Diocese to re-open the church as of Sunday the 6th September. From the 6th, we will do a Sunday and a Wednesday service at 11am. Those wishing to attend will need to book a place at either the Sunday or the Wednesday service each week, but not both, as the amount of people able to attend is limited. We would encourage you to use the online booking system for this, which will allow you to choose a day to attend. You can find the link to book on the weekly emails we send out or on the Homepage at: www.ChristChurchLanark.com. Please choose the number of virtual 'Tickets' you need based on how many people from your household will attend. You don't need to bring a ticket or confirmation email with you. Please try your best to use the online system as it helps us keep track of the numbers attending easily. Those who are unable to use the online system should either email Lee or phone Lee's landline number (0141 772 8176) and leave a message a few days in advance of the service. Please book a few days before the service. By booking and attending, you give your consent to us holding your contact details for 21 days and passing them on to NHS Test & Protect should anyone later test positive for Coronavirus.

### What to expect

- If you or anyone in your household is displaying Covid-19 like symptoms, please do not attend. Instead, engage with the NHS Test & Protect process for further advice.
- You will need a face covering, but you may also wish to bring your own hand sanitizer and a cushion (as all pew cushions will be removed).
- As you approach Christ Church please place your face covering on before entering the building -it will have to be worn throughout the service apart from when receiving communion.
- You will then be invited to use a hand sanitizing station near the entrance.
- Friendly stewards will be on hand to help with queues and to direct you on social distancing guidelines and seating arrangements.
- Please sit as close to the front as you can, on the pews marked by a green tick. Filling the building from the front to the back.
- There can be no singing by the choir or congregation. Musical recordings may be used to aid worship instead. No physical sign of The Peace can be shared at this time.
- Liturgy will be displayed using the projector and will be familiar, but if someone has trouble seeing the projector, an alternative will be provided.
- Communion (bread only) will be given to you whilst you remain seated in your pew by one of the clergy. Please remove your face covering, take communion and re-cover your face, ideally using hand sanitizer before and afterwards.
- When leaving after the service, please leave using the side fire exit next to the choir stalls, as we are operating a one-way system. Those at the front of the church should leave first, followed by those at the back. Please use the hand sanitizing station placed near the exit.
- 2m social distancing should be maintained at all times whilst within the building, particularly when entering and leaving the building. Floor markings will indicate where it is appropriate to stand.
- Toilet facilities will remain open, with disposable wipes available for cleaning surfaces used.
- The church remains disabled-access friendly and open to newcomers (if booking made in advance).
- No financial offering will be taken, but a plate will be available at the back of the church.

#### GROWTH

Almost a year ago I was given a beautiful orchid as a house-warming present. I was delighted at such a beautiful gift but at the same time I was a bit scared of it. If I'm honest my success with house-plants is so patchy I thought caring for an orchid was beyond me. However, thanks to some tips from the giver of this gift, my orchid is not merely still alive - it is thriving. I am amazed at its growth and the extraordinary number of blooms it has produced.

According to guides on plant care there are a number of factors for success, namely the correct amount of watering, humidity, sunlight, fertiliser and pruning. Given the right conditions growth occurs. At first growth happens in secret, deep inside the roots and shoots of the plant. Eventually buds appear on the stems which gradually open up to reveal the beautiful petals and inner structure of the flowers. Even though I see my orchid every day there have been times when I've suddenly become aware of how much it has grown as new buds come forth and blossoms emerge.

Psalm 139 speaks of the hidden nature of growth:

For you created my inmost being; you knit me together in my mother's womb.I praise you because I am fearfully and wonderfully made; your works are wonderful, I know that full well.My frame was not hidden from you when I was made in the secret place, when I was woven together in the depths of the earth.Your eyes saw my unformed body; all the days ordained for me were written in your book before one of them came to be.

Although the early stages of growth are hidden from view, God our creator sees them. He knows who we are and what we are made of. He saw our potential before anyone knew we existed. Year on year we grew in stature until we reached adulthood. We also grew mentally, emotionally and spiritually and we continue to do so throughout our lives. Over the last few months I've been reflecting on the fruit of the Spirit: love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, generosity, faithfulness, gentleness, and self-control. Each week I looked at an individual fruit, reflected on it and turned to God in prayer. Just like my orchid, I found myself in an environment that allowed growth to happen even though it was largely hidden.

Growth is imperceptible in the moment, but we can recognise it with the benefit of hindsight. Sometimes the context for growth has been painful but you are given the grace to get through. Sometimes growth happens in the routine of everyday life as we faithfully kept putting one step in front of the other. Sometimes we've gained a sudden new insight that enabled a growth spurt that was joyous. God is doing a secret work in each of us, enabling us to become more hopeful, confident, resilient and whole. One day God's work in us will be revealed for us all to see. Whatever way our growth is happening, we will be encouraged as we look back and see how we have coped, changed and flourished.

#### **Escaping after Lockdown!**

A recent trip to the Knapdale Peninsula in the Argyll region took us to St Columba's cave. A path past a small 13th century chapel leads you to a natural cave in the rock face.

It is traditionally said to have been occupied for a time by St Columba on his way from his home in Ulster to his final settlement at Dunadd and Iona. The story goes that Columba applied to King Conal for permission to establish his monastery at Iona. While he waited for the Kings decision the saint stayed here.

As you enter the cave mouth you will see a raised shelf of rock . A drystone altar has been built on the shelf and behind on the wall a small cross is carved. There are another two crosses carved in other parts of the cave.



The font at nearby South Knapdale parish church, Achahoish, is said to come from the cave. To the west of the cave is a smaller cave showing signs of a dwelling place.

So did St Columba stay here? There is simply no way of knowing but it has been used for human habitation over thousands of years.




