CHRISTMAS TREE PRAYERS



If you would like your Christmas tree to mean more this year, why not try this beautiful and thoughtful prayer idea?

Children love to help with decorating the tree. This idea is an easy way to let them get involved, and helps them pray at the same time.

- Buy some pretty gift tags (sparkly stars work well) or make some by cutting up last year's Christmas cards.
- Write on the plain side the names of people or situations that you want to pray about.
- Hang the gift tag prayers on your tree as a sparkly reminder just as your tree lights shine in the darkness, so your prayers are like a candle that lights up the lives of those in need.
- Christmas is a particularly difficult time if you are sad, or ill, or lonely or worried. Keep a few spare gift tags so you can add to your tree when **you** think of others who need your prayers.

Tip: If you know someone needs your prayers, but it's best if others don't know they're in need, why not just write their initial on the tag, or draw a heart shape – God will know you are thinking of them.

RECTOR'S LETTER

Dear Friends

Driving to the hospital to do some pastoral visiting the other day I listened, on Radio 4, to a very stimulating discussion on "What is truth?" The discussion was a lively one – quite mind boggling in places. One point that really got the participants going and caused a bit of



a rumpus was over whether Christians, in a pluralist society, should be able to hold a view that they claim is a universal truth when others categorically do not agree with them.

As you can imagine I, too, was as exercised by this point as the people speaking on the radio, so much so that my mind was locked on it as I marched along those interminable corridors at Wishaw General. By the time I arrived at the door of the ward I was looking for I had concluded that a definitive answer probably couldn't be found, but the whole debate came back to me as I sat down to think about what to write here...

Christmas is coming and we, as Christians, have a very strong belief about what the Feast of the Incarnation means. We believe it means God sent his Son into the world as a baby, in the person of Jesus, and that he lived, died and rose again from the dead. This we hold to be true. It is our truth and it is a ground breaking, earth shattering truth. God on earth! God in human form! No wonder it has challenged generations and continues to be a stumbling block to many. And yet it is a truth that gives meaning to our lives, it changes the way we live, it colours our view of the world and underpins how we relate to all human beings. That is what Christmas is about – for us.

It can be a struggle to hold on to the centricity of that fact when Christmas for the world is focussed simply on present giving and family get-togethers. The truth of Christmas gets watered down, domesticated, made tame and even sidelined, and we say nothing, because we don't want to be seen to peddle an unpopular or even a ridiculed belief, we don't want to come across as being dogmatic in our society of many beliefs. And yet, that is our truth of Christmas, and we believe it is a universal truth, one that has real meaning for the whole world, and is very relevant for today and for all people. While we hold that view, it doesn't mean we have to impose it on other people, but neither does it mean we should be embarrassed by it.

We should proclaim Christ's birth with sincerity, with confidence and with joy. I hope that this Christmas, in these pluralist times, you will do just that and derive great blessing from the proclamation.

The artist Botticelli in his painting of the annunciation – the moment when Mary receives the Advent news of Jesus birth – shows the very human act of waiting, with its internal conflicts and worries. There is a conflict within Mary going on in the painting, shown in her stance towards the angel. The shame of having a baby prior to marriage in her culture would have been unliveable. The responsibility of raising any child is a heavy one – how much more the responsibility of carrying God's own Son. She realised this announcement would change not only her fate as a person, a woman, a mother; but the fate of all who in Israel hoped for a messiah, and all in the world who longed for spiritual and eternal life. But, the hesitation and resistance we see in her posture is not found as we gaze towards her face. There we find the calm serene acceptance of the message and the task before her. Like Mary, may we respond to the call of God in this time and place during Advent, moving beyond our fears and anxieties towards graceful acceptance of God's Son.


It has been so good in our working lives to be part of Christ Church, appreciated by patients, pupils and colleagues alike, and we have been given far more by being a part of it than we have given to it.
