

## Drew's Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends

January is often thought of as the driest of months. After all the excitement, colour and vibrancy of the Christmas and New Year Celebrations January can feel a bit of a damp squib, and the weather usually does little to dispel that impression. So, if you're anything like me, you'll be glad it's now over and that things are moving on.



As we enter February there are signs of the first daffodils and crocuses pushing their wee heads through the hard ground and the chatter of the birds in the trees (especially the tree at my bedroom window!) is definitely getting louder and louder. These and other signs point us towards the brighter, longer, warmer days that lie ahead.

So, if you're anything like me, you'll be glad it's now over and that things are moving on. These and other signs point us towards the brighter, longer, warmer days that lie ahead.

I've been reading up on my biblical history of late. What has amazed me in my reading is how quickly and easily the nation of Israel wandered away from God throughout its history. There were times when morally and spiritually Israel was a very dark place. Under the wayward leadership of some bad kings idols were worshipped, the Temple got neglected, bad practices were adopted and God's Word was forgotten. And yet, in spite of those regular slippages, there were always signs that God had not abandoned his people; through thick and thin God still sought to establish his will among them and to fulfil his purpose for them. Great prophets arose to keep the flame of truth burning. Kings like Hezekiah and Josiah came to the fore with the reforming zeal to bring their people back to God. In the fullness of time Jesus the Son of God emerged – the ultimate sign that God had not abandoned his people or the world he loved and longed to reconcile and save.

I believe these signs continue. The story of Jesus is still being told, people are still giving their life to him, and his love, living in and through them, is making a huge difference to so many in so many places and ways. The great purpose of God, as far as I can see, is still moving forward to the day when all darkness and pain will be eliminated from human experience.

Thanks to God's grace we can be involved in all of this through our individual callings to strive for the best and to be instruments of God's truth, love and justice. We need to remind ourselves of this from time to time and to be encouraged to realise that all things are possible under God. There was a moment when the Psalmist realised that with God's help he could be an example to many, a sign of God's presence in the midst of all the challenges of life. "I have been like a portent to many, but you are my strong refuge" (Psalm 71: 7) That is not just something for us to admire; it's also something for us to aspire to.

## **STUDY GROUPS IN CHRIST CHURCH**

Every two weeks the Bible Study Group gets together in the home of one of its participants to conduct a focussed study on one of the books of the Bible. Over the years they have covered the epistles of Paul, the Gospels, some of the Prophets and aspects of the Pentateuch. The Group's next meeting in February will be on Wednesday 24th in the home of Peter & Susan Clark. All welcome.

During Lent the Rector intends to respond to a request from a number of people in the congregation for a refresher course on the basics of Christianity, including aspects of what it means to be an Episcopalian. This course will run on Wednesday evenings throughout Lent (21 & 28 Feb, 7, 14 & 21 Mar) meeting at 7 pm in the Memorial Chapel of the Church. If there are specific topics that you would like to have explored in that course, please drop your suggestions in the box on the table at the back of the church.

Later in the year the Rector also intends to respond to another request from a number of people in the congregation for a course that explores in some depth some of the theological conundrums that people struggle with as faithful people in an increasingly secular world. One topic that will definitely feature will be "Evil & Suffering and The God of Love". There will be others that you wrestle with too. Once you've made your list, again pop your requests in the box on the table at the back of the church. The Rector will then tailor make the course to fit your specific requirements.

As someone once said: "Studying the faith is not where your journey ends; it's where it begins." Get started this year at one of the opportunities on your doorstep.

No reason for putting in this photo except for the fact that Bill is a long and faithful member of our Church Family and he looks so happy to be in church.






**Accelerate Vocal Response:** A condition which causes the sufferer to try to sing faster than the organ.
