- The booking system will stop working when a service is fully booked. Please try another service if this occurs.
- If you think you will be unable to attend after booking, please let Lee know by each Friday at 5pm, so that others may use your slot.
- If you are aware of anyone struggling to book a place, you may book tickets on their behalf online using their name.
- If you are still unable to use the online system, you can phone Lee at 0141 772 8176 on any day apart from Saturday (day off) to discuss booking.
- By booking and attending, you give your consent to us holding your contact details for 21 days and passing them on to NHS Test & Protect should anyone later test positive for Coronavirus.
- If you have any symptoms of Coronavirus (cough, change in taste/smell, temperature) then please inform the NHS and do not attend the service.


#### "THE SHACK" by William P. Young



I was given this book by a parishioner a couple of years back with the instruction: "Read this and tell me what you think!" Having done so, I now find myself saying the same to others. This is a story book which carries a huge punch. Mack, the main character, who has serious doubts believing in God, loses his daughter in tragic circumstances. He then has an invitation to go to the "shack" where his life and faith are confronted, questioned and challenged. The book raises questions about the nature of God, what we really believe about the Trinity, the question of suffering while believing in a loving God, and what it is like really to know God.

It certainly isn't the best written book that I've ever read, but it is one that is hugely memorable and worth every effort. I challenge anyone to remain unaffected by reading it!

#### "FINDING HAPPINESS" by Abbot Christopher Jamison



"Life, liberty and the pursuit of happiness" is the banner by which so many live today. We all want to be happy, but do we know how to find happiness which has depth, quality and durability? It seems not, as more and more people express a dissatisfaction with today's consumer society and wake up to the fact that something is missing. This is an extremely readable book in which Abbot Christopher (of Worth Abbey) discusses what happiness is and looks in turn

at the "demons" which make us happy. His insights are perceptive and relevant and he truly offers us new and achievable way of living. There is nothing exclusive in what he says – his message is for us all. Often, while reading, I would exclaim: "That's brilliant!" One of the best books I have read in a long time.

## Resting in His Presence

"Come away to a deserted place all by yourselves and rest for a while." (Mk 6:31)

When I was growing up Summer was a magic time. No school, freedom and discovery. Life was simple. Long walks in the country with my friends, sometimes stealthily crossing farmers' fields to take short cuts. My favourite outing was collecting birds eggs with my brother. We wandered far and wide and it felt like I had gone to the ends of the earth. Then back home for tea!!

As an adult my understanding of summer or times of rest changed. After months of hard work - and usually feeling at the end of my tether - a holiday or break consisted of eating, drinking and sleeping. All good in themselves and packed into a single week in the year. However, this experience led me to ask myself what I was doing with the rest of my life. Working and sleeping? I wanted more! Where was the rest and inner peace that I sought and needed?

The wisdom of the Spiritual giants speaks of 'Otium Sanctum' or "Holy Leisure". We certainly don't ask for a day of work to have some Otium Sanctum - but the spiritual concept and practice might help us slow down from the fast-paced lives that we have and the seemingly endless demands. It might even help us relax! Yes - relax in the midst of all that might stress us.

When St. Augustine started a community and wrote his rule - he clearly had in mind that the brothers and sisters would have time simply to be in the presence of God and pursue interests and hobbies outside of the structured life of prayer and meditation. This indeed was healthy for the community members as it allowed them to be creative and opened them to all kinds of talents. The early monks of the Eastern tradition who went out into the desert to search for God in silence and solitude also had activities that were at one and the same time restful and spiritual. From gardening and growing vegetables to basket weaving or making clothes - they spent their time productively and enjoyed what they were doing. Often, they would pray the Jesus Prayer by simply repeating his name while gardening or sewing.

Our place apart could be sitting in the garden, having a coffee, knitting or crafts. Time apart in His presence.

Would it not be nice to look at our activities in a different way? Instead of living in chronological time with hours and minutes we could look at our use of time in the sense of Kairos which would be time leaning towards the eternal. All we do and all persons we meet are stepping-stones and encounters to life eternal which is already here but not quite yet. So why not choose to live our times of rest and relaxation for what they are. Rest and relaxation that allows the inner self to ponder on the mysteries of God and thus be renewed in His grace and love. Then love shall be the measure of how we live. So put the kettle on!

#### St John Francis Regis - patron saint for relief workers


Do you ever admire relief workers? Those hardy folk who regularly appear on our TV screens, actively seeking out the disease-ridden, starving, destitute people of the world, instead of avoiding them, as most of us try and do.

John Francis Regis (1597 - 1640) could be a patron saint of relief workers. It all began back in the early 1600s when he was ordained a Jesuit priest in Toulouse, a town raging with plague. Instead of fleeing for his life, John Regis decided to stay and minister to the plague victims.

Somehow he survived, and was then sent by his bishop to do mission work in Pamiers and Montpellier. For years John taught and preached Christ's love, and also put it into action: he collected food for the hungry, clothing for the poor, visited prisoners, and even set up some homes for desperate exprostitutes.

In mid-September of 1640 John had a premonition of his approaching death. He took a three-day retreat in order to calmly prepare himself for it – and then he went back to work. Over Christmas, while helping the poor, he caught a chill. By 31st December he was dying of pneumonia, but at peace: he had been granted a vision of heaven, and could not wait to get there. His was a life well lived – he was "a good and faithful servant".


