


LUNCH CLUB

Come along and enjoy friendly company, homemade soup and a filled roll. There are also frequently speakers and slide shows.



Dear Friends

**I will lift up mine eyes unto the hills:
from whence cometh my help.
My help cometh even from the Lord:
who hath made heaven and earth.
(Psalm 121)**



Mountains feature very prominently in the scriptures - Ararat, Sinai, Nebo, Hermon, Tabor to name but a few. In many cultures, since time immemorial, high points have been the place to worship, which explains why so often medieval churches are to be found on the high ground of an ancient community, built on earlier pagan shrines.

Mountains were the places to which Jesus retreated when he needed time out and away to be alone with God. Not only do mountains speak so eloquently of the glory of God the creator, they also provide a vantage point from which life can be viewed in a different perspective. As someone who grew up in this part of the world I've been to the top of Tinto countless times. When I lived in Dumfries I also made a point of scaling Criffel as often as I could. The views from the tops of these hills are etched in my mind. I still find that a retreat way up into the hills gives me a chance, not only to do some clear thinking, but also to encounter the glory of God.

It is not without significance that Jesus, as he sets his face towards Jerusalem, takes his three closest disciples to a mountain top where he is transfigured before them. This is what gives them all the courage to face what lies ahead. Again it is on a mountain top (in Galilee in Matthew, the Mount of Olives in Luke/Acts) that the Ascension, which we will soon be marking, takes place. Having observed the solemn forty penitential days of Lent, the glorious fifty days of Easter now form a continuous mountain top experience. Allowed to do their work in us they will not only nourish our souls but also enable us to see our lives in a new perspective in the context of God's unconditional love and to grasp the future with confidence in him.

This is the logo for our Diocese's Strategy for Mission and Growth. It was created for the launch of the Strategy seven years ago when Gregor Duncan became our Diocesan Bishop and it still serves as an attractive reminder of the mission work to which every congregation, indeed every Christian, is called to undertake.

It has been a few years since we here in Lanark engaged with the Diocesan Mission and Growth Strategy. Many activities come to a halt at the start of a new incumbency; our Mission Action Planning was one that took a back seat when I became your Rector. That does not mean that mission and growth ceased to be important, either for you or for me. In the two years that we have been journeying together there has been a great deal of discernment going on in the background about the direction and shape of God's call to us as a community. We are now in a position to respond to that call and move from discernment into action.

To that end a new Mission Action Planning team has been created. The members of the team (some from the previous MAP team with the addition of some new ones) will hold their first meeting in the very near future to begin work on three goals that have been identified to foster continued numerical growth, outreach into the community and new approaches to children's ministry.

I ask your prayers and support for the team as it embarks on its important task of promoting growth and development in our community of faith. As it says on the logo: "May we grow with God's grace in Glasgow & Galloway."

Our Church Garden

In Lanark November and December were mostly wild, wet and rainy and on looking at my diary the first heavy snow came on the 16th January this year. So we can say that winter really sets in here in mid January. February followed on with deep snow and very cold temperatures which continued into March. Hopefully, now that May is nearly here we shall all be released from winter's grasp and be able to get out into our gardens once again.

The first plantings in the Church pots are the primroses (variety Wanda) along with the miniature Tete-a-tete daffodils. These are such brave plants; the smaller daffodils will remain impervious to cold windy gales which would break and destroy taller flowers and the primroses even survive mild frosts. These latter are an evergreen variety and their bright flower colours contrast with the "wilder" natural woodland area behind the pots. The plant's generic name Primula is derived from two Latin words meaning "first rose". In the Middle Ages a concoction made from primroses was used as a remedy for gout and rheumatism and an infusion of the roots was taken for headaches. I would rather the congregation used aspirin etc., instead of our small floral display, for their ailments!

The large daffodils which were planted under the trees are now showing through and hopefully will have flowered for Easter Sunday!

The pots lift the flowers up to a higher level where not only do the plants have good drainage, but their patterns of colour can be seen and enjoyed more easily by people walking up to the Church. Make sure you notice the snowdrops flowering behind the Church gate on your way out!

I would like to take this opportunity to say thank you for the beautiful services taken by the Reverend Drew during Lent and Holy Week. It is clear how very hard Drew has worked throughout this most Holy time, an exhausting time mentally, physically and spiritually, as each service in Holy Week seamlessly ran into the next, the Easter message wonderfully delivered.

In the ecumenical Service on Holy Wednesday, Drew spoke of the betrayal of Judas and how betrayal would impact on us today. This led to some deep thought especially as we traced the actions of Judas, in the throwing down of coins onto the floor of the Altar.

A profound action as the coins rattled noisily on the tiles, breaking the silence and stirring up much emotion as we pictured the scene as it unfolded.

Again on Maundy Thursday, feelings ran deep with emotion as each part of this moving service ran its course. The Washing of the feet bringing us to the Upper Room and the humility of Jesus on His knees. The Stripping of the Altars, followed by the Watch of the Passion brought about such feelings of sorrow and sadness, one could almost feel the pain of our dear Lord as he prepared to die.

Those who attended the Good Friday Devotion, could not fail to be moved at the depth of its context, and accompanied by some unbelievably moving singing by Drew, took us, in our minds, to the barbaric scene of the Crucifixion and the unthinkable suffering of our Lord Jesus. Individual, yet inextricably linked, each service was delivered with devotion, sincerity, care, passion and love, and ran like an invisible thread, drawing us all together as one in Christ our Lord.

Away Giving – First Quarter 2018




Mouse Makes


