REPORT ON THE A.G.M. 2017

A huge thank you to the members of the congregation who stayed for this year's A.G.M. held in our Church Hall after the Sung Eucharist on Sunday 1st October. This was the first A.G.M. under the new format put in place by Drew our Rector. It seemed to work well.

The A.G.M. Document, containing reports written by Group Convenors and Office Bearers and issued a fortnight in advance of the meeting along with copies of the Annual Accounts, provided the whole community with informative summaries of what has been happening in Christ Church over the 12 months since the last meeting. 

Drew's Pastoral Letter

Dear Friends

Watching a programme about The First World War on my ipad the other day I was struck by a throw-away comment which stated that, after The Great War, there was barely a family in the United Kingdom that had not lost either a member or at least someone from within the circle of friendship. The statistics are not precise but there were close to 1 million deaths recorded from the



British Empire. Waves of suffering flooded into the homes of rich and poor and left a permanent sense of loss.

The extent of it is staggering and yet in a way it was merely a prelude to the bloodiest century of all. It is estimated that during the 20th Century between 160 million and 216 million people were killed in wars and genocides.

The Season of Remembrance, which we are just about to enter, is an opportunity for us all to focus on the consequences of war and to remember that the lives which make up the statistics were real men and women who were loved and valued by others. My old sacristan in Greenock found Remembrance Sunday very, very difficult because he lost a brother in the Far East. Another lady quietly thanked me after I conducted a service in a nursing home because as well as remembering husbands and fathers who were lost I also mentioned boyfriends.

There are so many stories and so much pain. That's why the Season of Remembrance also has to be a time of commitment that we will work and pray until the day dawns when, in the words of the old hymn, we will 'study war no more.' That will only be when the Prince of Peace returns and his voice commands peace in the midst of all human conflict. But we also hope and pray that he will recognise his own as those who have been instruments of his peace in their own circumstances and ways.

Away Giving

As most of you already know, on the last Sunday of each month all the money in the collection plate is given to a different charity each quarter.

Bobby Burgon reported at the AGM that the congregation has again responded incredibly well to our charity giving collections throughout the year. A total of £2600 was distributed to New Beginnings (Clydesdale), Children in Distress, Direct Link (Kenya) and the Bishop's Lenten Appeal which was for the Scottish Refugee Council. Additionally, a sum of £460 being the collection at the Christingle service was donated to the Lotus Flower Trust.

Throughout the year the congregation has also continued to give generous support to New Beginnings by donating household items and tins and dry foods for the Clydesdale Food Bank. Many thanks to Connie Johnstone for organising this.

This quarter the away giving is for **Children in Distress** which is a small charity dedicated to saving the lives of Romania's disabled and abandoned children. The initial foundation support of Children in Distress was within the Anglican Communion. The Charity is dedicated to helping suffering children in the Balkans and Eastern Europe. It works with the sick, the incurably and terminally ill, those with HIV AIDS or Autistic Spectrum Disorders, the physically handicapped and those who face a daily challenge for life as result of accident, infection, genetic or birth defects, those who daily face discrimination or religious persecution, the socially excluded, the desperate and disadvantaged children and families, the poorest of the poor.

Andrew (d. c.60) - Patron Saint of Scotland

The apostle Andrew is patron saint of Scotland. According to the gospel of Matthew, Andrew and his brother Simon Peter were the very first two disciples whom Jesus called. "Come, follow me, and I will make you fishers of men." (Matt 4:18,19)

Without more ado, they obeyed. "At once they left their nets and followed him." The story is touching for the simple but total faith that they had in Jesus.

Whenever the gospels mention the disciples, Andrew's name is always in the first four. Rather than a boisterous leader of men (like Peter), he seems to have been an approachable person who wanted to help people.

It was Andrew who helped introduce a group of Greeks to Jesus (John 12:20-2) and Andrew who offered Jesus the five small barley loaves and two small fishes when Jesus challenged them to feed the five thousand. (John 6:8) His faith in Jesus over small things was richly rewarded, and this faithful, kindly Galilean fisherman turned disciple went on to become one of the 12 apostles of the Christian Church. Andrew never settled back in Capernaum by Galilee. Instead, his 'fishing for men' seems to have taken him far. One ancient tradition links him with Greece, where both Scythia and Epirus claimed him as their apostle. Another place in Greece, Patras in Achaia, claimed to be the place where Andrew was eventually martyred. Like Jesus, he was crucified, but the story goes that during the two days it took him to die, he preached earnestly to the people about Jesus. Andrew was not afraid of death on a cross – he had seen it before, and knew one thing for certain: because of Jesus, there was nothing but eternal life ahead of him.

In the West, Andrew's feast-day was universal from the 6th century, and hundreds of churches were named after him in Italy, France and England. But how did he end up as patron saint of Scotland?

Well, according to one ancient legend, his relics were taken from Patras to Scotland in the 8th century, and ended up in Fife, where a church dedicated to him was built and became a centre for evangelisation and later pilgrimage. As Andrew was the only apostle to make it as far as Scotland, he was chosen as patron saint. But Andrew did not stay in Scotland. After the fall of Constantinople in 1204, it is said that the Crusaders took his relics to **Amalfi.**

In art Andrew is depicted with a normal Latin cross in the most ancient examples. The saltire cross 'X', commonly called St Andrew's Cross, and which represents Scotland on the Union Jack, was associated with him from the 10th century.




In May of 1208 the relics of St. Andrew arrived in Amalfi, and since then they have been preserved in this lavishly decorated crypt. Behind the main altar is a small and richly decorated case that contains the skull reliquary of St. Andrew. The rest of the saint's relics have been buried below the altar, which is topped by a large bronze statue of St. Andrew created by Michelangelo Naccherino in 1604.

During this summer I visited the Cathedral of Saint Andrew in Amalfi. It is a wonderfully ornate building and you can still visit the Crypt of St. Andrew which is stunning, although the church warden was not happy when I took a flash photograph!


> According to the Bible, the Children of Israel crossed the Red Sea, right?' 'Right,' said his teacher.
